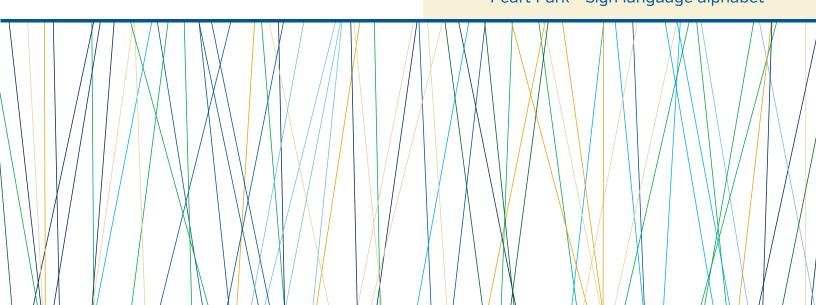
## Statement of Organizational Commitment

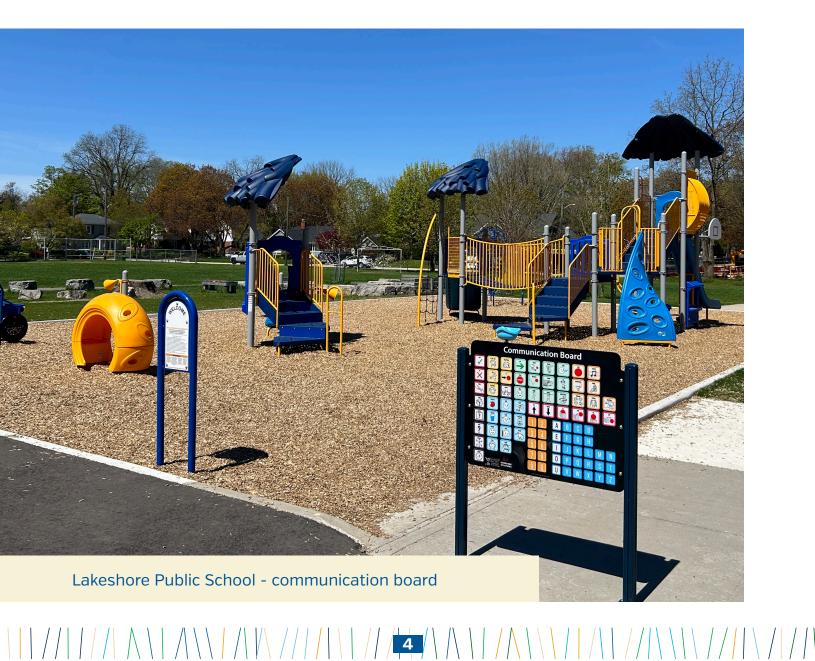
Peart Park - Sign language alphabet



## 2023 Accessibility Progress Report

Our 2023 Accessibility Progress Report is the City of Burlington's update on the measures taken to improve accessibility in our community and reports on the progress made to implement the activities introduced in our 2019 – 2023 Multi-Year Accessibility Plan.

The city's multi-year accessibility plan describes how the city will continue to remove barriers and improve accessibility to our goods, services and facilities over the next five years. Our plan aligns with the Burlington Strategic Plan 2015-2040, incorporates the legislative requirements of the Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act, 2005 [AODA] and provides our approach to compliance with Ontario's accessibility legislation.



### **Accessibility Legislation in Ontario**

### The Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act and its regulations

In 2005, the Government of Ontario passed the Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act (AODA). Its goal is to make Ontario accessible for people living with disabilities by 2025 by creating, implementing and enforcing accessibility standards. These standards are the rules that businesses and organizations in Ontario must follow to identify, remove and prevent barriers so that people living with disabilities will have more opportunities to participate in everyday life.

The standards are contained in one regulation called the <u>Integrated</u>
<u>Accessibility Standards Regulation</u>, also known as the IASR. Currently, the IASR is made up of five standards and several general requirements that apply to the city's business in the following areas:

- Customer Service
- Information and Communication
- Employment
- Transportation
- Design of Public Spaces

# The AODA and the Ontario Human Rights Code

The AODA and the Ontario Human Rights Code (the Code) work together to promote equality and accessibility. The Code states that people living with disabilities must be free from discrimination where they work, live and receive services, and that their needs must be accommodated.

Under the Code, the City of Burlington has a legal obligation to accommodate any person with a disability regardless of whether they are an employee, volunteer, resident or visitor. The duty to accommodate means that wherever unequal treatment or discrimination exists, it must be remedied unless the remedy would cause undue hardship. The Code has primacy over the Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act and its regulations.

The AODA and the Ontario Human Rights Code work together to promote equality and accessibility.



## **Legislated Reviews**

## Review of the Accessibility for Ontario with Disabilities Act, 2005

The AODA requires a regular statutory review of the Act and its regulations. In February 2022, the Government of Ontario announced the appointment of Rich Donovan, a global expert in accessibility and economic value in the disability market, as the fourth legislative reviewer of the AODA.

Mr. Donovan provided his final report, with 23 recommendations, to the province in June 2023. After "careful review and consideration" the province silently released the report on December 14, 2023.

#### Review of existing accessibility standards

Each accessibility standard is required to be reviewed every five years after it becomes law to determine whether it works as intended and to adjust if required. The Transportation, Employment, Information and Communications, Customer Service and the Design of Public Spaces standards are currently under review.

Final recommendations for the Transportation Standards were submitted by the Standards Development Committee to the minister for consideration in May 2018.

Final recommendations for the Employment Standards were submitted by the Standards Development Committee to the minister for consideration in January 2019. Final recommendations for the Information and Communications Standards were submitted by the Standards Development Committee to the minister for consideration in February 2020.

The Design of Public Spaces Standards are currently under review with minutes of the Standards Development Committee last posted in September 2023.

The second review of the Customer Service Standards began in October 2023. Initial recommendations for the Standards Development Committee are anticipated in spring 2024.

The province is silent on the timelines for the release of the reviewed standards. **Each accessibility** standard is required to be reviewed very five years to determine whether it works as intended and to adjust if required.

#### **New Standards**

Three new standards are in development - Health Care Standards, Kindergarten to Grade 12 (K-12) Education Standards and Post-Secondary Education Standards. Public consultations with respect to the initial recommendations for all 3 standards have been completed and the Standards Development Committee submitted their final recommendations to the minister in Q1 2022. The province is silent on timelines for the release of the new standards.



## **Federal Accessibility Legislation**

## Accessible Canada Act, Bill C-81

The Accessible Canada Act: An Act to Ensure a Barrier-Free Canada came into force in 2019. The Act's stated purpose is to identify, remove and prevent accessibility barriers in areas that apply to a wide range of federally regulated jurisdictions. This includes:

- Industry sectors such as banking, telecommunications and transportation
- Government of Canada departments and agencies
- Parliament
- Crown corporations
- Canadian Armed Forces
- Royal Canadian Mounted Police, and
- First Nations band councils

As federal, provincial, and territorial governments develop policy there is potential to establish a collaborative approach.

The legislation established Accessibility Standards Canada to develop national accessibility standards. Several technical committees are actively developing standards in the following priority areas:

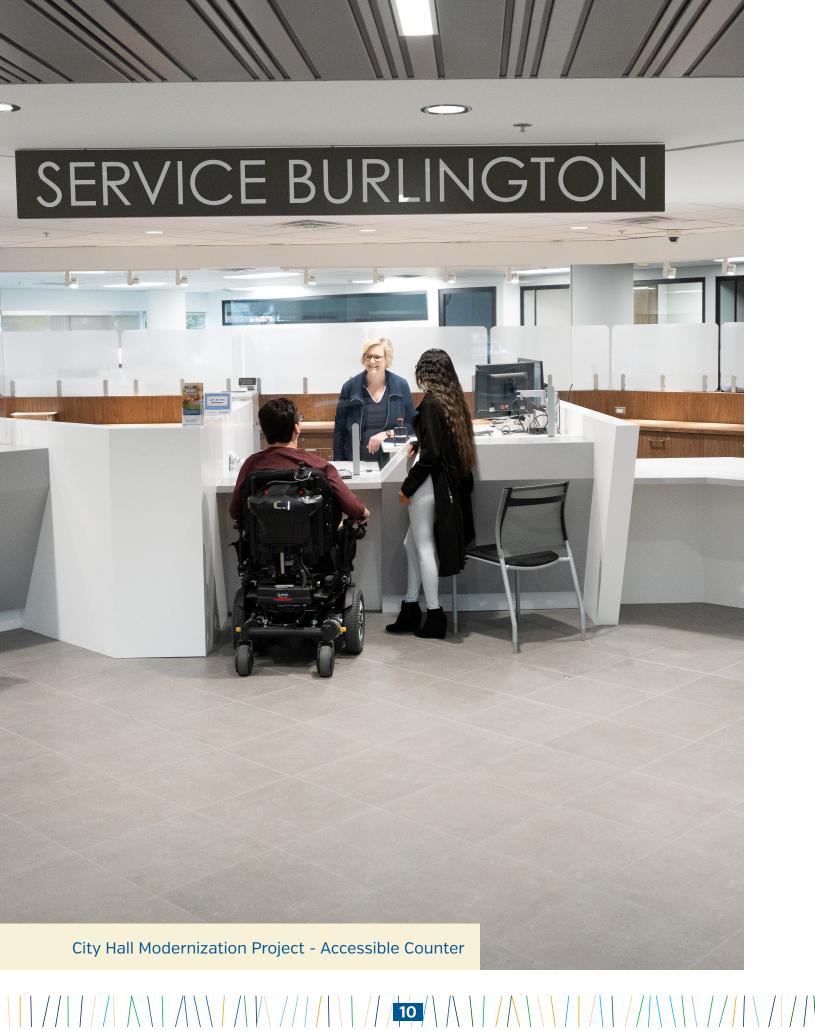
- employment
- the built environment (buildings and public spaces)
- information and communications technologies
- communication, other than information and communications technologies
- the procurement of goods, services and facilities
- the design and delivery of programs and services, and
- transportation (airlines, as well as rail, road and marine transportation providers that cross provincial or international borders)
- · emergency egress

Like the relationship between the AODA and the Ontario Human Rights Code, the Accessible Canada Act recognizes and builds upon the existing human rights framework that supports equality for people with disabilities in Canada. This includes:

- the Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms
- the Canadian Human Rights Act, and
- Canada's commitments to the United Nations Convention on the Rights of Persons with Disabilities

The goal of the Act is to create a Canada without barriers by 2040.

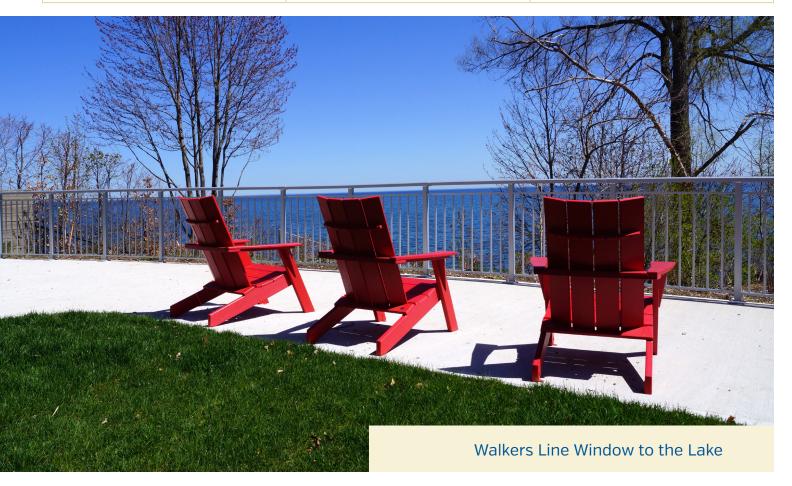

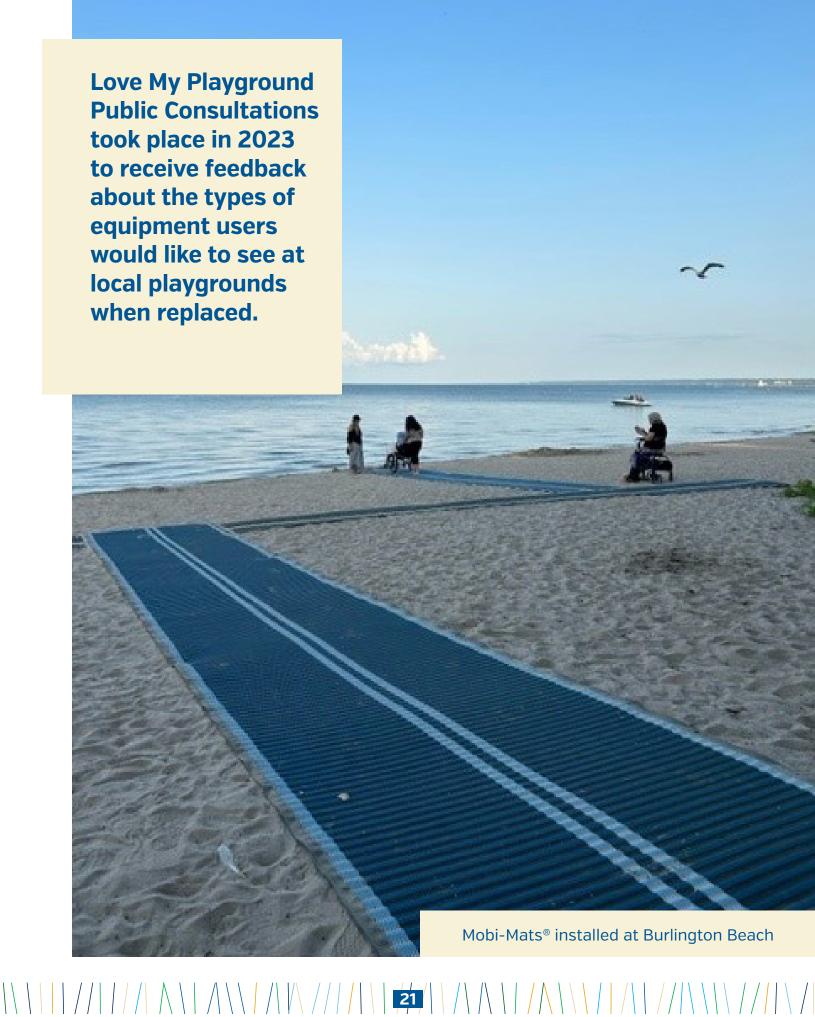

# Notable activities by the Burlington Accessibility Advisory Committee (BAAC) in 2000 to 2022

The AODA requires that the city have an accessibility advisory committee and a majority of members be people with disabilities. Established in 1994, the BAAC provides advice to staff and Council on accessibility issues, not only to help remove existing barriers but also to prevent new barriers from being created. The BAAC was consulted on the following projects in 2023:

- Robert Bateman Community Centre
- Recreation Department Learning Forums

In 2023, the BAAC participated in Town Hall opportunities with Mr. Rich Donovan for the 4th review of the Accessibility for Ontarians with Disabilities Act and its regulations.

BAAC had a booth at the Burlington Centre Farmers' Market in June, 2023 during National AccessAbility Week to seek input from the community to inform the 2024 – 2028 Multi-year Accessibility Plan. They also had a booth in October to distribute Treat Accessible signs for Halloween as a part of their ongoing commitment to public education.

BAAC members toured Burlington Public Library Central Branch for a demonstration of the many accessibility improvements that have been made to the built environment and additions to assistive technologies.

BAAC also participated in Food for Feedback community engagement opportunity in September 2023. Members were on hand to answer questions from the public and distribute surveys to inform the 2024 – 2028 Multi-year Accessibility Plan. More than 70 completed surveys were received at the event.

In 2021, BAAC designed and purchased a flag for the International Day of Persons with Disabilities (IDPD). The community was invited to the flag raising event in December 2023. BAAC was delighted to welcome many members of Special Olympics Burlington. Students from Halton District School Board and Halton Catholic District School Board created displays that were made available at City Hall for the public to view during the week including IDPD.

A National AccessAbility Week flag was designed by the Rick Hansen Foundation in 2023 for all to use to raise awareness about accessibility. The community was invited to the flag raising at City Hall with the BAAC and elected officials.

Hon. Raymond Cho, Ontario Minister of Seniors and Accessibility, visited Burlington in March 2023 to acknowledge two Inclusive Community grants received by the city and to announce a new round of grant funding for the program. Minister Cho met with councillors, city staff and members of the BAAC and the Seniors' advisory committees. Burlington MPP Natalie Pierre joined the minister in celebrating the successful projects implemented through the grants to improve accessibility in the community.

BAAC chair and staff were interviewed as part of a three-part series titled Focus on Accessibility, which examined issues related to accessibility in Halton. 'EVERYONE BELONGS': Halton making progress toward universal accessibility, reports on the measures being taken by local municipalities to address accessibility issues throughout the community.
