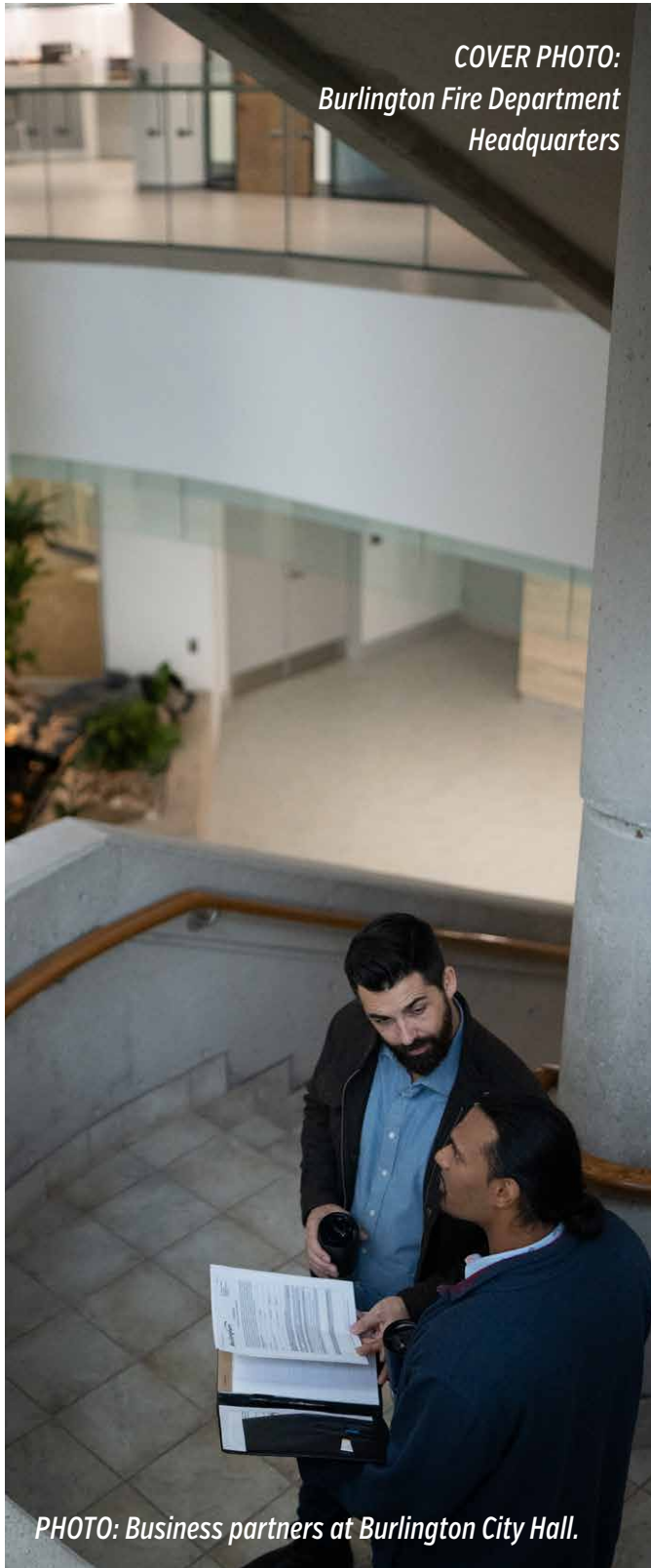

Committed to serving you

In July, Council approved the 2026 Financial Forecast report, officially launching this year's budget process with a focus on limiting tax impacts for residents. The current projected total tax increase is 4.49 per cent, which includes services provided by the City of Burlington, Halton Region (including Police Services), and the Boards of Education. Of this amount, the City portion of your total tax bill is projected to be 3 per cent.

The budget will be prepared with four principles in mind: affordability, sustainability, liveability and transparency. My top priority is ensuring Burlington continues to deliver the high-quality services you rely on, while keeping our city affordable. Whether it's maintaining our community centres, repairing roads, or enhancing our parks, together with staff, Council and the community, I'm focused on making smart, responsible investments that reflect the needs and values of our residents. Every dollar the City spends must work hard for you.

I invite you to take part in the 2026 budget process by attending one of our budget town halls, taking place in each ward in the city. You can attend any session that's most convenient to you. Your feedback helps guide Council's decisions and ensures we continue building a city that works for everyone.

My top priority is ensuring Burlington continues to deliver the high-quality services you rely on, while keeping our city affordable.

I'll be co-hosting these town halls with City staff and participating Ward Councillors. We answer every question and take back every piece of feedback - because your voice matters.

Let's work together to build a stronger more affordable Burlington. I look forward to seeing you this fall. ■

Ward 3 update

Here's what's happening in Ward 3:

- **Greening the Crosstown Trail** - This pilot involves naturalizing the trail in the Mountainside community to improve flood resilience and support native species. Planning work will take place this fall. On-site trail work is expected to begin next year.
- **Third Annual Community Rural Forum** - Rural Ward 3 residents are invited to attend the Third Annual Community Rural Forum, hosted by me, taking place from 6 to 9 p.m. at the Kilbride Fire Station on Thursday, Sept. 11. Meet with many organizations that matter to rural residents. From 7:45 to 9 p.m., join me for a townhall-style discussion.
- **Deputy Mayor Updates** - The Youth Fare pilot will begin on Sept. 1, 2025, offering youth free monthly transit after paying for 20 rides (\$38), and will run until June 30, 2026. Transit has initiated a new 5-Year Strategic Plan with Watt Consulting. Rider and resident engagement will start in September, learn more at getinvolvedburlington.ca. The new plan will be ready in 2026.

The City of Burlington is making significant investments in two major community hubs: the Skyway Community Centre and Park, and the Robert Bateman Community Centre, reaffirming its commitment to accessible, inclusive, and sustainable public spaces.

Investing in community spaces

The Skyway Community Centre and Park, undergoing a \$39 million redevelopment, is one of the City's largest infrastructure projects in recent history. Set to open in Fall 2025, the new facility will feature an NHL-sized ice pad, a multi-use indoor track, and versatile program spaces. Outdoors, Skyway Park is being transformed with a 275-foot baseball diamond, a natural playground, accessible pathways, and shaded gathering areas. The project also emphasizes energy efficiency and sustainability, by maximizing heat recovery, incorporating geothermal systems and reducing emissions by up to 85 per cent compared to traditional facilities.

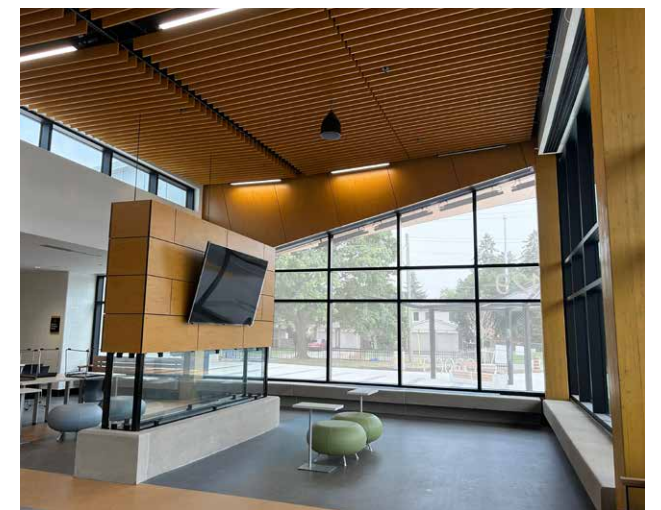
Meanwhile, the Robert Bateman Community Centre is being repurposed from the former high school into a vibrant multi-use facility. It will house community partners such as TechPlace, Burlington Public Library, Halton District School Board, City of Burlington and Brock University, creating a collaborative space for learning, innovation, and recreation. The City is investing in modernizing the building to meet accessibility standards and support a wide range of programming for all ages.

These investments reflect Burlington's vision of fostering connected, active, and resilient communities. By revitalizing these spaces, the City is not only preserving essential public infrastructure but also enhancing quality of life for residents across generations. ■

Investing in a flood-resistant Burlington

Climate change is a global problem with local consequences and solutions. Recognizing the severity of our changing climate, City Council declared a climate emergency in 2019. Slow, steady rain seems to be increasingly replaced by heavy, isolated downpours. While we can't stop the rain, the City is making important infrastructure upgrades to manage stormwater and keep residents safe.

In 2025, the City is investing over \$12 million in stormwater management projects to reduce flooding in target areas. This brings the City's total investment in stormwater management from 2015 to 2025 to over \$90 million.

Flood safety is a shared responsibility. The City is asking for the public's continued cooperation and awareness to help ensure flood responses run smoothly. Residents can support these efforts by keeping storm drains clear of leaves and debris, reporting any blocked or damaged drains, and flood-proofing their homes through a variety of measures, including considering City or Regional flood prevention programs. ■

Standing up for Canadian businesses

As global trade dynamics shift, the City of Burlington remains committed to supporting our local economy. With ongoing tariff challenges that began earlier this year, we're focused on ensuring Canadian businesses remain strong, competitive, and resilient.

Burlington proudly celebrates Canadian-made goods and services and welcomes local businesses to grow and invest in our city. The City of Burlington works with more than 3,100 vendors, and of those, less than 5 per cent are registered with primary addresses outside of Canada.

In May, City Council approved a six-month, interest-free property tax deferral program for industrial properties directly impacted by U.S. tariffs. This application-based support gives qualified businesses extra time to meet their tax obligations, without penalties or interest.

The City is investing in Burlington's future by backing the businesses that call our city home, and encourages residents to do their part by buying Canadian and learning more about the impact of supporting local. ■

City kickstarts e-scooter pilot

Need to scoot along Centennial Trail to get to work or maybe catch the bus or GO Train? The City has SCOOTY rental e-scooters you can ride on Centennial Trail, between Brant Street and the Elgin Promenade and the end of Centennial Trail at Burloak Drive.

E-scooters are available 24/7. You must be at least 16 years old to ride and if you are under 18 years old, you must wear a helmet. If you are 18+, helmets are optional and strongly recommended.

Be a safe, courteous rider. Scooters can be ridden in the service area along Centennial Trail and cannot leave the trail. Make sure you start and end your ride in a designated parking zone and rent a scooter for each rider. Please stay off the sidewalks and share the trail with all other users.

You need to have the SCOOTY App to rent an e-scooter. The app is available for Apple and Android devices.

This is part of the City's Integrated Mobility Plan and will run as a two-year pilot until 2027. Let us know what you think! Share your feedback with the City at city@burlington.ca or 905-335-7777. ■

Living with coyotes

Coyote sightings are common in Burlington's green spaces, where they play an important role in the ecosystem. While generally shy, they can pose a risk to small pets, especially during dispersal season (September–December). Residents can take steps to safely coexist with coyotes in Burlington:

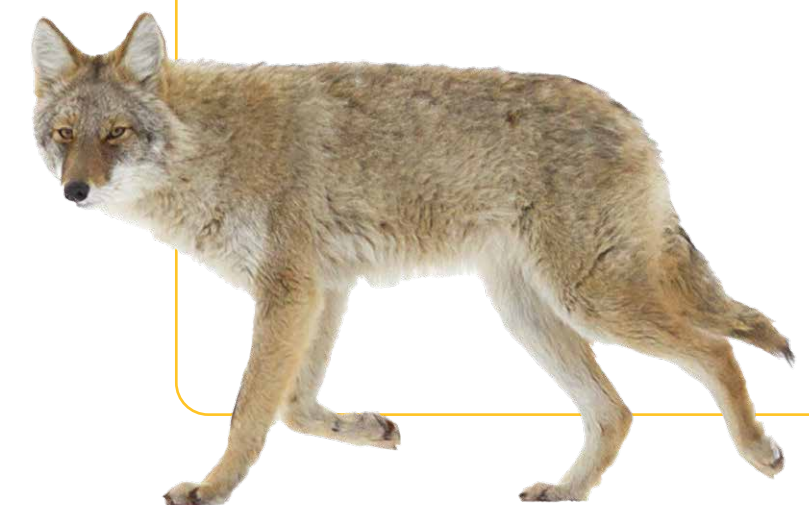
Report Sightings

Your feedback helps us to monitor the location of coyotes in the community. If you see a coyote, or observe a potential problem related to an overgrown building site, garbage or someone intentionally or accidentally feeding a coyote, you can assist the City by submitting an online report.

Drop by a Coyote Pop-up

Every other week, Animal Services hosts a Coyote Etiquette and Petiquette Pop-Up at Central Library (2331 New St). Stop by our pop-up table to ask questions and learn more about a variety of topics, including how to haze coyotes and coyote-proof your property. ■

City offering 95K for each new Additional Residential Unit

Additional Residential Unit Incentive Program

If you're a property owner in Burlington, you could get up to \$95,000 to add another living unit on your property. Burlington's ARU Incentive Program provides financial support to create new affordable rental Additional Residential Units (ARUs) or renovate an existing ARU to bring it up to legal standards.

The program helps cover costs for up to three Additional Residential Units (ARUs) on properties within Burlington's urban boundary. ARUs are self-contained, permanent living units with their own kitchen, bathroom and sleeping areas. They are on the same property as a primary home, including single detached homes, semi-detached homes and townhouses.

ARUs can be inside or attached to a main house, such as a basement apartment or garage conversion, or in a separate building like a permanent tiny home.

Program Incentives

The program offers homeowners and non-profit organizations fee waivers for eligible municipal fees up to 100 per cent, 10-year forgivable loans for affordable ARUs of up to \$95,000 and one-time grants of up to \$15,000 to renovate a non-compliant ARU. ■

City receives federal funding to support short-term rental enforcement

The City of Burlington has been awarded \$759,719 over two years from Housing, Infrastructure and Communities Canada to support enforcement of the City's new Short-Term Accommodation By-law. The by-law, which came into effect on May 1, 2025, was shaped by nearly 500 survey responses and thoughtful community input. The by-law places a strong focus on supporting safe, welcoming neighbourhoods and protecting housing availability for residents.

The by-law limits short-term accommodation (e.g., Airbnb, VRBO) to a maximum rental period of 28 consecutive days and a total of 183 days per year. It requires all short-term accommodation operators to be licensed and includes clear rules around occupancy limits, parking, waste management, and safety standards.

If you rent your property as a short-term accommodation, the by-law applies to you. Applying is simple, and City staff are here to support you every step of the way.

This funding will help the City add more enforcement officers to ensure a fair and consistent approach. Our focus is on protecting the community while working collaboratively with operators. Stricter enforcement will begin in September. ■

New City ward structure approved



In May, City Council passed bylaw 30-2025 to make minor changes to the city's ward structure. New ward boundaries will be in place for the 2026 Municipal Election. The changes reflect resident input gathered during the Council Composition and Ward Boundary Review. The new ward structure will accommodate growth and population shifts for the next three municipal elections. It also aims to help ensure voters are represented equally in decision-making, no matter where they live in the city.

BUDGET 2026



Work to build the 2026 budget is underway. Hearing from you is an important step in the budget process. With rising costs and global economic shifts, the 2026 budget strives to balance affordability and maintain the essential services that foster a vibrant, high-quality of life in our City.

City Council approved the 2026 Financial Forecast report on July 15, with a focus on limiting tax impacts for residents. It provides a preliminary look at the economic pressures and service needs that will shape the 2026 budget.

As part of the budget process, Council endorsed a Mayoral Direction for City staff to prepare a proposed budget with a total tax increase (this includes the budgets for Burlington, Halton Region, and the Boards of Education) in the order of 4.5 per cent, with Burlington's share of the total tax increase being less than 3 per cent.
